

Essay # 3 – Comparison and Contrast Essay

Comparison = similarities

Contrast= differences

The comparison-contrast method is closely related to the idea of studying a definition, because ‘definition’ aims at the description of a particular thing by identifying its properties while also isolating it from everything else. Comparison-Contrast is also closely allied with Plato’s idea that we learn a thing best by reference to its opposite; that is, one way of finding out what a thing is to find out what it is not.

Choosing a Topic - Your first task is to decide where to place your emphasis. Comparing one or two elements of a literary work is easier and more effective than comparing every element of each work. For example, you may wish to concentrate your comparison and contrast on imagery, or mood, or style.

Don’t try to compare dissimilar things. Compare like with like: idea with idea, characterization with characterization, imagery with imagery, point of view with point of view, problem with problem.

FIRST ONE, THEN NEXT METHOD

*** A common, but inferior way to compare- contrast is to make your points first about one work and then do the same for the other. This method makes your paper seem like two big lumps, and it also involves repetition because you must repeat the same points as you treat your second subject. This method is only satisfactory.

INTERLOCKING METHOD

***** The superior way is to treat your thesis in its major points and to make references to the two writers as the reference illuminates your idea. Thus you would be constantly referring to both writers, sometimes within the same sentence, and would be reminding your reader of the point of your discussion. Also, your reader is not required to refer back to the previous paragraph to see what you did there.

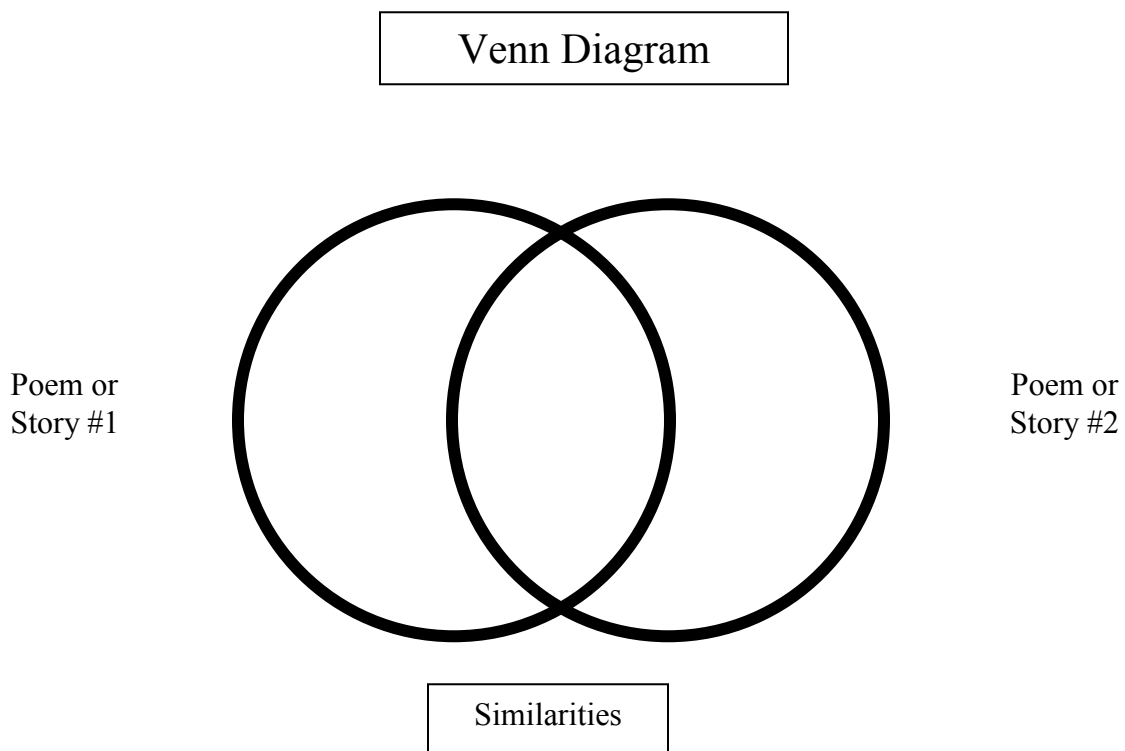
A Venn Diagram

A Venn diagram can help you organize your ideas for a comparison and contrast essay. To sketch a Venn diagram, draw two intersecting circles.

-In the part where the circles intersect, jot down any similarities in the literary works.

-On the left side, write down the unique qualities of story or poem #1.

On the right side, write down the unique qualities of story or poem #2.



Preparing an Outline

Once you have sketched your Venn Diagram and written the first draft of a thesis statement, it is time to prepare your outline.

To prepare an outline for a comparison and contrast essay, use your Venn diagram to write topic sentences for each paragraph. It is important that each paragraph contains an analysis of both of poems /stories you are writing about. Don't write a whole paragraph about just one of the poems.

Strategies for Writing Your Essay

Identify the title and author of the poems/ stories in your introductory paragraph.

Use the present tense to write about them poems/ stories.

Use quotations from the poems/story to support your points.

SIGNAL WORDS FOR COMPARISON AND CONTRAST ESSAY

If your essay is coherent, your reader should be able to follow your train of thought. The chart below gives some examples of words that link ideas.

Paragraph 1: Thesis Statements: The Toyota Matrix and Mazda 3 offer drivers similar options in the same price range; however, the Toyota Matrix's service costs and re-sale value make it the better choice for the discerning young buyer.

Paragraph 2: Both cars come with great standard options.

Examples: They both have great stereos

Matrix: 6 CD, mp3, 6 speaker BOSS system.

Mazda 3: 6 CD, mp3 6 speaker Blaupunkt system

They both come with front and side air bags

They both have the same cargo space

They both have similar horse power and handling

They both have similar gas mileage

Paragraph 3: They both have a similar price tag.

Matrix \$28,000 after taxes
