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Synopsis:

It takes a dinner table to raise a family

No Good Deed is the story of a family of individuals that are so overwhelmed by their own personal issues that they neglect to see the warning signs of a larger crisis. The film takes place over the course of a day.

Peter is a realtor concerned with selling his next house to support his family. Karen, his wife, is too occupied with her day off and impressing her friend that she spends more than she can afford. Megan, their teenage daughter, is experimenting with drugs and sex as a distraction from responsibility. And Alex, the youngest son, just wants his family to come together as he cooks breakfast for them, but no one eats.

With everyone worried about their own issues, they forget about ordering Alex's diabetes prescription. Megan neglects to pick up Alex from school. After walking home he goes into a diabetic shock and his sister Megan must handle the emergency after trying drugs.

The family rendezvous at the hospital and once they are reunited they begin to realize the errors of their selfishness. At the end of the film the family shares a snack and there is some bittersweet hope that they can have a shifting of priority in their lives.
