## Important Guidelines

1. All the titles and subtitles must be written in Sentence case (only the first letter of the first word must be written in uppercase).
2. The full paper should be 10 to 12 pages excluding the title page, abstract, references and annex.
3. Lines in the document must be numbered: Go to Layout → Line number → Continuous
4. Pages must be numbered
5. All sections and subsections must be numbered
  1. Main section (font size:13pt)
  - 1.1. Subsection (font size: 12pt)
  - 1.1.1. Subsubsection (font size: 12pt)

Numbered lists can be added as follows:

  1. First item
  2. Second item
  3. Third item

Bulleted lists look like this:

  - First bullet
  - Second bullet
  - Third bullet
6. The preferred font of the journal is Cambria.
7. The text should be in 12pt with space 1.0, except for the abstract and the keywords. See below.
8. The referencing style to be used is APA (American Psychological Association), sixth edition.
9. The journal language is English (UK). You can easily set the language by highlighting the text of the entire document (Ctrl A) and selecting UK (English) from the Status Bar below.
10. Set the text wrapping on the inserted figures at “In line with text” and set its alignment to centre. Please, do not use low quality photos or diagrams.

## How to structure your paper?

### 26 **Abstract:**

27 The abstract must be written as a single paragraph. The abstract itself should be set in 10pt in single  
28 space. Please do not make reference-citations in the abstract and please keep it within the limit of 350  
29 words.

30 **Keywords:** keyword 1; keyword 2; keyword 3 (List three to ten pertinent keywords specific to  
31 the article; yet reasonably common within the subject discipline).

32 The keywords should be given below the abstract (Font size 11pt).

### 33 **1. Introduction**

34 The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it  
35 is important. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance. The current  
36 state of the research field should be reviewed carefully, and key publications cited.  
37 Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. Finally,  
38 briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions. As far  
39 as possible, please keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists outside your field  
40 of research.

### 41 **2. Materials and Methods**

42 The Methodology of research should be described with enough detail to allow others to  
43 replicate and build on published results. All materials, data, computer code, and  
44 protocols associated with the publication should be explained sufficiently.

### 45 **3. Results**

46 This section must be separated from the Discussion section. It should provide a concise  
47 and precise description of the experimental results. All sections and subsections must  
48 be numbered.

### 49 **4. Discussion**

50 This section must be separated from the Results section. Authors should discuss the  
51 results and how they can be interpreted in perspective of previous studies and the  
52 working hypotheses. The findings and their implications should be discussed in the  
53 broadest context possible. Future research directions may also be highlighted.

## 54 **5. Conclusions**

55 This section is not mandatory but can be added to the manuscript if the discussion is  
56 unusually long or complex.

### **Conflict of interest**

Declare conflicts of interest or state *“The authors declare no conflict of interest.”* Authors must identify and declare any personal circumstances or interest that may be perceived as inappropriately influencing the representation or interpretation of reported research results. Any role of the funders in the design of the study; in the collection, analyses or interpretation of data; in the writing of the manuscript, or in the decision to publish the results must be declared in this section. If there is no role, please state *“The funders had no role in the design of the study; in the collection, analyses, or interpretation of data; in the writing of the manuscript, or in the decision to publish the results”*.
