1. You must have prior coursework or other background learning relevant to the proposed independent project. These guidelines are as follows:
 - a. To attempt IS (298) at least two prerequisite courses are required.
 - b. To attempt IR (398) at least five prerequisite courses are required.
 - c. First-year students may not take IS/IR courses.
2. Consult with the department chair or program director for more information on whether the IS/IR will apply towards your major.
3. IS/IR does not fulfill WRI/OEP unless specifically approved to do so. IS/IR cannot fulfill any other General Education or OLE Core requirements.
 - Students using catalog years 2021 to the present are eligible to receive OEP credit; students using catalog years 2020 and older are eligible to receive WRI credit. *To find your catalog year, view your DegreePath in the SIS.*
 - For instructions on how to apply for OEP or WRI, please see page 3.
4. Submit your completed application to the Registrar's office in Tomson Hall, or email it to registrar@stolaf.edu. Make a copy for your own records.
 - The Registrar's office will add the course only after this form has been submitted and approved. If the completed form is submitted after the last day to add a course, a petition to late add is required in order to add the course.
