- Taking notes on your summer reading book is **optional**, but taking notes can help you comprehend more of what you read and notice distinctive elements of the text.
- Any notes you take will not be graded; however, you can use your own original notes to support your participation on an in-class assessment such as a student-led discussion.
- This note-taking guide begins with a few targeted questions for your grade-wide read that your teacher may discuss with you in class; the rest of the guide asks you to note your own observations, questions, and responses to the text.
- You may print the guide and hand write your responses, or you may type your responses.

Book Title: *Purple Hibiscus*
Author: Chimamanda Adichie

Essential Points to Ponder:

These questions may be discussed in class when you return to school. Consider these questions as you take notes on the categories in the charts below.



1. How does Eugene's public life differ from his private life? Is he a hero? A villain? Something else?
2. Auntie Ifeoma tells Kambili that "what was different was just as good as what was familiar"(166). How does this statement apply to Kambili and other characters in the novel?
3. How do different characters define success? Which character's idea of success do you agree with most?
4. A friend of Auntie Ifeoma states, "it is what happens when you sit back and do nothing about tyranny. Your child becomes what you cannot recognize"(244). How does this statement apply to different characters? Which characters stand up against oppression? What are the results of their actions?
5. What is the significance of the purple hibiscus? What ideas does Adichie develop through this symbol?
6. To what extent does Kambili reject or adopt the cultural values of her father, her aunt, Father Amadi, and other characters? What does it mean to be Nigerian in the novel?

4. Did you notice any other literary techniques, such as irony, figurative language, or a distinct tone of voice? Anything else unique about the writing style or figurative language in the text?	

Conflict & Resolution

1. What was the most significant conflict in the story?	
2. Were you satisfied with how the conflict(s) were resolved?	
3. What do you still want to know or understand about the conflicts in the text?
